Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope this latest Millfield Messenger finds you and your families safe and well in these difficult times.

I would like to thank our local families who visited our first virtual Open Evening and thank them for the wonderful emails I received about the whole team. Millfield has a wealth of opportunities on offer for all children, no matter what their interests are, we always strive to inspire them. We are incredibly proud to be oversubscribed again for September 2021, and the team and I are already looking forward to meeting the newest members of Team Millfield next year.

Since March, the support and kindness shown by our children and their families has been incredible. This year held the Rotary Shoe Box appeal again and we filled over 65 special shoe boxes with goods and toys which will be sent to those in need in Eastern Europe. Closer to home, we are busy raising funds and collecting donations so we can make food hampers for our families over the Christmas period. A thank you goes to Morrison's in Cleveleys who are also donating goods and hampers to help our families. And a final thank you goes to our thoughtful parent, Emma Tierney, who generously donated 800 face coverings for our students.

At Millfield, we have very low incidents of bullying and if it does occur, we take swift and immediate action. However, we have just introduced our new anti-bullying initiative (ABBA), where every form has a student ambassador who will be trained to help other students in their form. To help this initiative, we were grateful to receive a kindness bench from the Kindness Counts Trust, a group of volunteers who raise funds to help combat bullying in all schools across the Fylde Coast.

This year, remembrance services were cancelled, however on 11th November, Luke Park, our Head Boy and Harriet Piper, our Head Girl, and I, held a small remembrance service at the front of school. The rest of the school had a remembrance service with their class teachers and the whole school then held a two-minute silence to remember those who have lost their lives or been affected by war.

Thank you once again for your continued support in these challenging times.

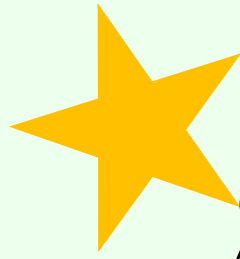

- ◆ Students' resilience in their undertaking of their couch to 5km



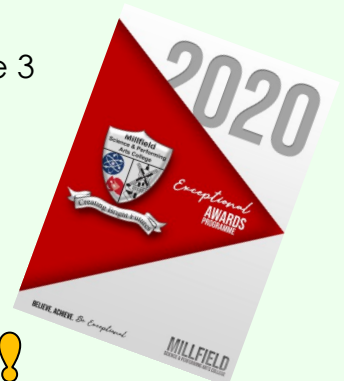

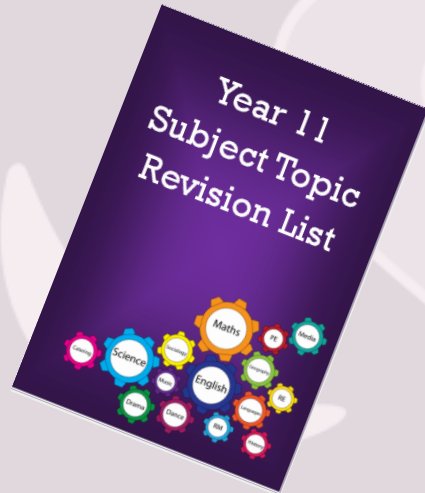
KEY STAGE 4

Improve your everyday maths with the National Numeracy Challenge

National Numeracy is an independent charity working to improve numeracy across the UK.

The Challenge is a free website to help you check and improve your numeracy: managing your money; working out measurements and understanding percentages, rather than algebra or trigonometry.

In March 2020 the Challenge was updated with a whole new look. There is a new quick check so that it only takes around ten minutes to practise or check your skills, videos to show that however you feel about maths, you're not alone, and increased flexibility, so that you can choose what you want to do.



However you feel about maths, you can use the Challenge to:



Quickly check your everyday maths



Improve your skills



Increase your confidence with numbers



Find out the level you're working at, your strengths and weaknesses, and print a certificate



Get the 'Essentials of Numeracy'



Get yourself ready in your own time to take a more formal maths course

Plastic free kitchen!

(Well, nearly). We are so used to using plastic in our kitchens these days that sometimes we forget we're using it.

You see that dishwasher sponge? Plastic. It isn't biodegradable and will sit around in a landfill for years to come. Why not try bamboo or coconut scourers, which are naturally antibacterial, and are now readily available online or in local, plastic free shops.

Take a look at your cooking utensils. Plastic? They usually are these days. We're not saying throw all your plastic utensils in the bin. You've bought them now, so you may as well use them.

However, when they need replacing, think about buying wooden or metal ones.

Now look in the cupboard. Cling film. The stuff of nightmares, both for those trying wrap with it and the environment. Beeswax wraps are a good alternative for the really eco conscious, and you can recoat them when the wax starts to come off. However, if you have airtight plastic tubs, use them instead, even in the freezer. One tip is to label the boxes so you know what's in there and what date you froze/refrigerated the food inside, helping to reduce food waste too.

There are plenty more ways to cut out plastic in the kitchen, but I'll save those for another time. For now, use what you have, and when the time comes to replace, consider plastic free alternatives.

Getting started with Sora

With Sora, you can get free ebooks and audiobooks from your school.

- 1 Install the Sora app from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store, or go to soraapp.com.
- 2 In Sora, find your school (or enter your school's setup code), then sign in.
- 3 Browse the Explore tab and borrow a book. Your book will open so you can start reading right away.
- 4 Close the book and go to your Shelf to see all your books (including assignments). From there, you can:
 - Tap Open Book or Open Audiobook to read or listen to the book.
 - Tap Options to renew or return the book, get to your notes and highlights, and more.

Teaching and Learning Tip

Growth mindset tip no.4: Explicitly welcome mistakes
The "Growth mindset" is the belief that "your basic qualities are things you can cultivate through your efforts." – Carol Dweck

Theory: Some students don't raise their hand in class because they fear criticism or embarrassment if they get a question wrong. The opposite should be true! Students should be eager to raise their hand because to get a question wrong is to learn from their mistake; to get an answer wrong is an opportunity to learn to self-correct and make progress.

Action: Please speak to your child about mistakes in a positive way. You can support a strong growth mindset by fostering a safe and secure environment in which making mistakes is not only accepted but actively encouraged as evidence of effort, effective learning and of getting better at something.
