English



What's happening in English?

Students in English have worked hard this half term and continued to impress the English staff with their knowledge and insight when studying language and literature. There have been lots of creative opportunities for our students and we're really proud of the way our Key Stage 3 pupils have engaged with writing for our local community: Year 7 have been reading, running and raising money for charity; Year 8 have written letters to local care homes and Year 9 have written Christmas poetry for care homes and households in the local area. We've also embarked on our Lancashire Book of the Year Journey, where one of our Year 9 classes will be involved with other Lancashire schools in reading and judging a range of exciting books. In terms of curriculum, our students have continued to study hard:

Year 7 have extended their study of Adeline Yen Mah's 'Chinese Cinderella,' but this time considering the book from the thematic perspective of 'Childhood.' English teachers have enjoyed watching students rise to the challenging content and vocabulary in extracts from Charlotte Bronte's 'Jane Eyre' and Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol.' Next term, we'll be looking at the interesting topic of language and how different languages have influenced and impacted on the English we use today.

Year 8 have continued to read Golding's 'Lord of the Flies' and have studied this in conjunction with the thematic unit 'Survivors'

where they have really improved their skills of empathy and studied how writers create tension. Next term, we'll be looking at the theme of rebellion and developing our persuasive skills.

Year 9 have completed their study of Steinbeck's 'Of Mice and Men' and have shown an excellent understanding of the writer's craft and how to describe. This term, students have started to look at 'Voices of War' and are really developing a solid foundation in formal essay writing skills.

Year 10 have concluded their study of Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' for their literature GCSE. Students have been analysing plot, theme, and character, and have developed their own narrative writing skills for GCSE language. Towards the end of this term, students have competed a short series of mock exams to test their knowledge and understanding. In December, Year 10 students will also enjoy a performance of 'A Christmas Carol' which will be live-streamed into our classrooms from The Old Vic theatre!

Year 11 have continued to revise their GCSE literature texts, checking their understanding of texts and knowledge of quotations. Staff have enjoyed marking students' narrative writing and have been impressed by the creativity of work. Mock exams were completed towards the end of November and the start of December, and staff are now marking students' papers before a grade is provided in January.

Reading, as ever, remains a high

priority for the English Department, KS3 parents should have received their latest edition of our 'Reading Matters' newsletter and all our pupils are participating in the weekly 'Register and Read.' Please encourage your child to discuss their reading with you at home, and if you need any advice or support linked to reading, please don't hesitate to contact us. The English Department wishes you all a very merry Christmas, and we'll update you again in the New Year.

Maths



Year 7 have started the year with an introduction to algebra. They have learnt about the different types of sequences and how to identify them. They have moved on to understanding how to substitute into expressions and collect like terms. Students have also looked at making estimations and in some cases working with standard form.

Year 8 started the year learning about ratio. They moved on to multiplying and dividing fractions and have finished the term learning how to plot and interpret linear graphs.

Year 9 started the year plotting linear graphs and investigating the equation of linear equations. They moved on to testing and proving conjectures. Students have finished the term by exploring 3D shapes, their net and surface area.

Year 10 students started the year looking at the four types of transformations. They followed





this by learning how to carry out constructions. They have finished the term learning how to use trigonometry, including non-right angled triangles.

Year 11 have bespoke schemes of learning and all classes have been revising different topics for the mocks that have recently taken place.

Year 11 intervention takes place every Tuesday for B1, B2 and B3 3- 4pm and every Friday for A1, A2, A3 and A4. Please let your child's teacher know if you would like your child to attend.

Revision strategies

When students have finished a topic, they should create a summary sheet that focuses on key information and model examples. This will help them to revise their work.

Science




Year 7

Students have had another excellent half term where they have learnt about energy transfers and the difference between renewable and non-renewable energy resources. Some classes will continue to learn about reproduction in animals, growing up and pregnancy. Students will also be taught chemistry and how acids and alkalis react, as well as studying the topic 'Current of Electricity', where students will study electrical circuits and how they work.

Year 8

After another busy half term studying about how plants grow through the process of photosynthesis, and how pressure can affect fluids, Year 8 students will start the New Year learning about the Periodic table: what it contains and how certain properties allow different chemicals to behave differently. They will also learn about the earth and space.



Year 9

Students have enjoyed extending their knowledge on plants and looking at the reactivity of metals. After Christmas, students will learn about 'forcefields and electromagnets' and will then move onto their first GCSE transition topic: 'Key Concepts in Biology,' where students will learn the fundamental skills of biology,

such as how to use a microscope and the structure of a plant and animal cell.

Year 10

In biology Year 10 students have been studying the fascinating topic of health, disease and the development of medicines: a topic which is particularly appropriate given the current climate! Students have been able to link what they are hearing about in the news in terms of the transmission of disease, as well as the development of vaccines, and how our bodies are able to fight infection. In chemistry students have enjoyed studying the process of electrolysis and its applications in the real world. Students have now moved onto using calculations in chemistry. Finally, in physics students have worked well through Newton's laws of motion, investigating momentum before linking force and momentum and then applying it to sports and road safety.

Year 11

The Year 11 students have had a busy half term which of course has included two weeks of mock exams. In biology students are beginning the final topic, which surrounds ecosystems and material cycles, where students will learn about biodiversity and the factors affecting it, as well as cycles such as the carbon, nitrogen and water cycle. In chemistry students have been learning about fuels and fractional distillation before moving onto studying the early atmosphere and the changes over time, before moving onto today's atmosphere and the future of our planet. In physics students have been studying the topic of magnetic fields and exploring the transfer of electricity around the UK. Students will be finishing the physics course studying the particle model and the effect of forces.



Art



Year 7 – Elements of Art

Year 7 have made a fantastic start to the school year, exploring the formal elements of art through lots of mini workshops. They have been using colour, pattern, texture and mark-making to demonstrate how artists add these within their work, producing lots of fantastic examples. This week pupils are zooming in on areas of Sarah Fosse's work and looking closely at the details and colours used to recreate an accurate example of her artwork.

Year 8 – William Morris inspired Wallpaper

Pupils have been exploring the Arts and Crafts movement with particular focus on the nature inspired artwork of William Morris. This past couple of weeks, pupils have been exploring how motifs are used and the different types of patterns that can be created with them. They have started to create their own designs that they will be producing this next week.

After Christmas, pupils will begin by looking at Artists Sarah Graham and Peter Slade in the new, still life topic on 'Sweet Treats'.



Year 9 – Street Art

Pupils in Year 9 have been exploring the highly-debated theme of 'Street Art'. They have explored several artists that work in very different styles like Banksy, Keith Haring and Shephard Fairey. They have created examples of artists' work and have just started to design their own skate decks that will be inspired by the themes we have explored.

Year 10 - GCSE Art & Design

Art students in Year 10 have recently started their independent research project. In this project pupils pick a theme to explore, which includes Culture, Environment and Conflict. They have completed some initial research on the theme by creating a detailed mind map which explores in depth how they could present ideas. A mood board of images and techniques that they wish to explore in the project has also been created. In this next week, pupils will be compiling more research on artists that relate to their chosen area of study.

Year 11 – GCSE Art & Design

Art students in Year 11 have recently started their final independent research project. The pupils are exploring their own ideas and themes and are well into the research stage of the project. There are lots of fabulous ideas already being explored including: Mythology, War and Celebrity Status. They have completed some initial research on the theme by creating a detailed mind map which explores in depth how they could present ideas. A mood board of images and techniques that they wish to explore in the project has also been created. In this next week pupils will be compiling more research on artists that relate to their chosen area of study.

Dance



Year 7

Pupils have been looking at the history and origins of Street Dance. We have also developed our understanding on choreographic devices and how these can be used to enhance choreography. All students have demonstrated

key movement in Street Dance style during the class dance. They have also choreographed their own Street Dance routine in small groups; all students were able to get up in their groups and perform their short routine that incorporated a choreographic device. I have been extremely impressed with their commitment and confidence! Next half term, we will be looking at body percussion and how this can be used in dance.

Year 8 and Year 9

Pupils have been learning how to analyse stimuli to come up with a dance idea. All students have been able to successfully analyse the stimulus "The Evacuee" which was a poem about children who were evacuated during WW2. Students then choreographed their own routine, trying to tell their own story about evacuation. Students have been able to work in small groups to ensure their movement communicates clear choreographic intent. Miss Kilmartin gave all students inspiration for their movement by getting information about her grandad's experience during WW2, as he was evacuated aged 8. Miss Kilmartin's grandad wrote students a letter describing what happened to him and how he felt. Next half term, we will be looking at musical icons. Students will explore what makes these celebrities icons and will use that as inspiration when choreographing their routine.

Year 10

In Year 10, we have continued studying section C of the written exam – Dance Anthology. The work we have been analysing is shadows. Students have studied, in detail, four production features (lighting, set/staging, aural setting and costume); they are aware of why these choices were made and how these features contribute to the overall





choreographic intent of the work. In practical, students have been learning how to incorporate the use of set into a performance to help communicate their choreographic intent. They have worked in small groups, choreographing their own contemporary routine, incorporating choreographic devices and relationships to enhance their performance. Next half term, students will be analysing Infra, developing their knowledge of the work and studying the four production features.

Year 11

Pupils have been studying the final work of section C - Dance Anthology. The final set work we have been analysing is Artificial Things. Students have studied, in detail, four production features (lighting, set/staging, aural setting and costume); they are aware of why these choices were made and how these features contribute to the overall choreographic intent of the work. In practical, students have begun their choreography unit. Students were given a range of external stimuli that they had to analyse; from this students have decided on an individual dance idea. Half of the class have choreographed their routine and have been teaching this to students. So far the choreographic intents being communicated are: suffering from PTSD, the story of Rosa Parks, domestic violence, how women gained the right to vote, alcoholism and the story of Princess Diana. These will be filmed at the start of next term and the final group of students will begin teaching their choreography.



Drama



Year 7

In the upcoming half term students will be studying pantomime; they will learn about the history of pantomime, stock characters and have the chance to create their own pantomime idea and write and perform a monologue for it.

Year 8

Students will develop their skills in creative writing, set and costume design by following the haunted mansion topic.

Year 9

Students will be focussing on soap operas. They will explore the history of soap operas, stock characters and have the chance to write and perform monologues and duologues for their very own soap opera.

During spring term, KS4 drama classes will continue to focus on the set text 'Blood Brothers', learning how to answer questions in preparation for their written exam. Year 10 students will continue to explore Blood Brothers through practical work and Year 11 students will continue to focus on their scripted performance.

Design Technology

Year 7

This half term students have been doing technical drawing and the basics of design; looking at what makes good design and how to implement this in their own design work.

Year 8 and 9

The second rotation of years 8 and 9 have been looking in detail at three of the principles of

design by

should be useful, aesthetic and innovative. Pupils this half term have been given the context "face masks" and have been tasked with solving a real world problem surrounding their context. This has been a great success, and every single pupil is pushing themselves to come up with a working solution to their problem. Working in this way is a fantastic lead into GCSE NEA (non-examined assessment) which is worth 50% of the final grade, giving pupils who wish to take the subject forward a clear idea of what to expect.

Year 10

Students are currently studying 'New and Emerging Technologies' and how they affect all areas, from industry to society. This has been interesting and we have looked at some very cool technology.

Year 11

Students are moving into developing ideas for their final prototype and are about to start designing in CAD (computer aided design.)

This has been a great half term for Technology at Millfield, and all the team are really impressed with pupil outcomes and ideas.







Film & Media Studies

Year 10 Film Studies

Students have completed their study of the Richard Ayoade film 'Submarine' and completed an assessment focussed on the aesthetic of the



film. Next term they will begin their study of 'Juno' and focus on the critical response to the film.

Year 11 Film Studies

During the last half term, students have been focussing on preparing for their mock exams and researching and planning their coursework which is to create either a storyboard or screenplay for the opening of a film. They will continue to work on this next half term and the coursework must be completed by February half term. Intervention is available on Thursdays, week B.

Year 10 Media Studies

Students have completed their study of television crime drama which focussed on 'Luther' and 'The Sweeney'. They will now move on to study magazines and their use of media language.

Year 11 Media Studies

During the last half term, students have been focussing on preparing for their mock exams and researching and planning their coursework, which is to create either a magazine front cover and double page spread or a DVD cover and billboard poster. They will continue to work on this next half term and the coursework must be completed by February half term. Intervention is available on Wednesday week B.

Food Technology

Geography

Key Stage 3

Year 7 will be continuing their learning on map skills and moving on to physical landscapes in the UK.

Year 8 will be continuing their learning on 'work, rest and play in the UK' and moving on to 'challenges and opportunities' in the UK.

Year 9 will be continuing their learning on 'Our Unequal World' and moving on to 'A focus on Africa'.

Key Stage 4- GCSE

Year 10 will continue looking at the work on 'Glaciation in the UK' and 'Climate Change'.

Year 11 will be moving on to 'Development'. Intervention after school will commence for certain students that have been selected to attend based on their mock exam results; however, I would encourage as many as possible students to attend.

Home-learning

Years 7, 8 and 9 are continuing with the work on Talaxy. Students have decided on the topic they are researching and planning their work on.

Years 10 and 11 are completing revision booklets using their green revision books.

Year 7 and 8 are continuing to follow the timetable being issued with the Knowledge Organiser.



Students have been looking at the importance of eating fruit and vegetables as part of their everyday diet. They have considered the seasonality of fruit and vegetables and are trying to eat a wider variety that are available at

Year 8

this time of the year.

Students have been looking at a range of issues, including food sustainability, food miles (and its impact on the environment) and animal welfare concerns, with a focus on egg production methods.

Year 9

Students have been finding out what Fairtrade is all about. Did you know that the logo itself actually means this:



Blue-sky that symbolises optimism.

An arm, raised in the air – this symbolises empowerment.

Green to symbolise growth.

They have also been looking at food labelling and using the traffic light system to work out how nutritionally different similar products can be.

Year 10

Students have been busy working on revision resources in preparation for their GCSE next year. The group is currently looking at the topic 'butter, oils, sugars and syrups' and have had the opportunity to make their own butter from double cream. This was an energetic and fun activity which resulted in them





Health And Social Care

Year 10

Students have been investigating how individuals deal with life events and the support received.
They should be researching the different types of support available for individuals. This will help when students come to the final stages of their assignment.

Year 11

Students have been preparing for the Health and Wellbeing exam in February 2021. Alongside this, all Year 11s need to make sure their assignments are up to date and given to Miss Taylor.

Students should use the revision guide provided for them and Microsoft Teams. Classwork is updated daily in students' Team folder. This can be used for revision purposes as well as missed lessons.

History



In History, pupils have studied a number of topics this term.

Year 7 have completed the Silk Roads and have moved on the Battle of Hastings, focusing on why William of Normandy won.

Year 8 have been looking at our absolute favourite topic: The Significance of the Tudors.


Year 9 have focused on a new unit on the British Empire with focus on British rule of India. They have enjoyed looking at the East India Company, the Black Hole of Calcutta and the Indian Mutiny, with lots of pupils stating they had no idea about the impact of the British Empire.

Year 10 have studied a unit on Crime and Punishment. In the past two weeks they have looked at how punishment changed at Pentonville Prison as part of their Historic Study. They really enjoyed learning about the gore of the death penalty in Victorian times.

Year 11

A special well done to Year 11, who completed three mock exam papers and all worked incredibly hard on revision and exam technique.

GCSE classes have also enjoyed a competitive element this term. Year 10 have a fortnightly 'Friday challenge' where they compete against class mates with knowledge and presentation to complete a revision task. Year 11 class wars was launched this week, where different classes complete history revision tasks to be the overall class winner. Miss Elliott won last year, but Miss Higgins is determined to be victorious this term! We have been so impressed with all the effort GCSE pupils have shown.

I.C.T.



Another busy half term with lots of maths in computing!

Year 7 students have been working on binary to decimal conversions and how ASCII is used in computers.

Year 8 have been converting between binary, decimal and hexadecimal.

Year 9 have worked through binary, decimal, hexadecimal conversions, logic gates and truth tables.

Year 10 Creative iMedia have continued with their coursework task which is worth 25% of their final grade. They are developing interactive multimedia products for a health and leisure club. Enterprise and Marketing students should now understand how to calculate breakeven points in a business and know each stage of the product life cycle. Computer Science students have been exploring laws relating to computing.

Year 11 Business Studies have looked at how to calculate break even and product life cycle. They are developing interactive multimedia products for a health and leisure club.



After Christmas, all Key Stage 3 students will be learning about Online Safety. They will explore how to keep themselves and their devices safe. Key Stage 4 students will complete the work started in Autumn term. Creative iMedia will start their next task and Business Studies will be working on Advertising and Marketing strategies.

Modern Foreign Language

Year 7

Year 7 students have been busy learning how to describe further details about themselves, including their likes and dislikes, and the things that are important to them. As we head towards the end of term, we will be looking at Christmas traditions in French-speaking countries and learning how children in France celebrate the festive season. Joyeux Noël!

Year 8

Students have been learning about Paris and its tourist attractions, as well as how to describe a fictional trip to France's capital city.

Despite "la pandémie" and Brexit, I will be looking to organise a Paris trip for May 2022 and will keep you all posted on progress with this over the next few months.

Year 9

We have moved on to learning about how to describe a healthy lifestyle and how to say what we are going to do to keep ourselves fit and healthy in the future. As we move into the New Year, students will be learning about the world of work and the role of languages within this, as well as how to discuss which jobs they would like to do later on in life.

Year 10

The festive season may be here, but Year 10 students have been learning how to describe holidays and where they usually go. Despite isolation, students have been busy building up their vocabulary and will also spend time talking about their dream holidays (a welcome break from the current situation!).

Year 11

Revision is the key element here, and with changes to the summer

exams, we are able to focus more on written skills and how to aim higher in the exam. Well done to all students who worked hard during the mock exams and after the Christmas break, we will carry on revising the key topics ready for the Summer.



Music



Students have been continuing to work on classroom-based tasks in music, and Sindy, the Bluetooth light-up speaker, has still been busy playing music all over Millfield! She even makes a 10-minute appearance in the Staff Work area on a Friday at 3pm!

Year 7 students have concentrated on musical instruments and their families and we've managed to have live demonstrations from a few budding young instrumentalists. Next half term, Year 7 will be learning all about musical loops.

Year 8 have put their previous learning about the musical elements into practise and have applied this to film music, showcasing the diagetic music of Marvel's 'The Black Panther'. Next term we will be focusing on songwriting.

Year 11 completed their mock exam and are now prepared for their Unit 1 Music Industry exam in January. Next term, we will be looking at exercises and warm-ups for their chosen instrument in Unit 5 Performance.

Despite many setbacks, including being unable to celebrate the festive season at the Millfield Carol Service, we have manged to prepare two virtual school events for the students this Christmas. As part of their work on Live Sound, Year 10 have put together performances for the Millfield Merry Mash-Up, and all the forms in school will get to watch this on the last day of term. The virtual staff show will also be going ahead and all of the acts have been recorded. Thanks to all staff for taking part; I'm sure the students will appreciate it. And a big thank you to Mr McMinn, who can be found in his studio, editing away...

Years 7, 8 and 9 will be developing their knowledge of rules and tactics, and ensuring they have a firm knowledge of badminton and football.

Year 10 and 11 will be continuing to develop their knowledge of officiating and leadership qualities. In OCR classes, Year 10 have been bridging the gap between their leadership and outdoor adventure assignments, including expectations set by the examining body. Going forward, students will be exploring how to plan a session for an outdoor adventure activity.

Year 7 have been looking at how they can manage friendships on and off line. They have also looked at ways to develop their resilience and work efficiently in a team. This has been a great success, with students really bouncing back using their bounce-back-ability skills. Next half term students will explore diversity, prejudice and bullying and being a better student. They will also investigate British Values.

Year 8 have investigated alcohol and drug misuse and managing peer influence and the risks. They have also looked at ways to develop their resilience and promoting human rights. This has been a great success, with student discussing the consequences of their actions and how they can support others in adversity. Next half term students will explore tolerance, extremism and tacklina discrimination. Students will also investigate ways of having a healthy lifestyle.

Year 9 have investigated managing conflict at home and tackling discrimination. They have also looked at ways to develop their resilience and varying rights and responsibilities. This has been a great success, with student discussing what they believe is a right, and what they believe should be a responsibility, to make sure everyone is allowed to have their rights. Next half term students will begin to explore GCSE Options: an extremely important time of the school year. Students will also investigate crime and punishment and gang crime.

Year 10 have explored crime and punishment. They have also investigated mental health and ill health, tackling the stigma surrounding this. This has been a great success, with student discussing how they feel and developing ways in which they may help others in the future. Next half term students will investigate careers and the laws surrounding drugs.



Year 11 have developed their understanding of the college application process providing opportunities to explore their aspirations. They have also investigated various revision techniques, preparing them for their exams. Students should now be revising on a nightly basis and preparing themselves for their



upcoming examinations, using the techniques developed in class. Remember to ensure you are always testing yourself and receiving feedback. This will help you to plan what you should be revising. Next half term students will investigate British Values and human rights, along with promoting self-esteem and coping with stress. Students will also consider taking responsibility for health choices.

R.E.



Year 7 – Pupils have begun their in-depth study of religion by looking at Christianity. This term they have looked at the church and what this is made up of. There has been some excellent class discussion where pupils have shown a real engagement in both lessons and with home work that has been set. Next term pupils will move on to look to question what makes a good role model from the Hindu religion.



Year 8 – Pupils have spent this term looking at whether the religion of Islam is represented fairly in the media. This has led to some great work surrounding the concept of discrimination and stereotypes. It is pleasing to see that these discussions have carried on outside the classroom, in the form of the talking home work. This allows pupils to formalise their ideas before bringing them into class and adding to the whole group discussion. Next term pupils will be looking at whether it is right to use violence, from a Christian perspective.

Year 9 – Pupils have spent this term looking at how the world has been created, from Christian and Atheist perspectives. Pupils have gained a good grasp of creation from a religious perspective by analysing some difficult religious scripture before assessing the more scientific, atheist viewpoint. It has been pleasing to see pupils bringing in work from other subjects, such as science, to support their arguments from an atheist perspective. This has led to some very well-analysed written pieces of work. Next term, pupils will be looking at the concept of where we go when we die, from both a Christian and Buddhist perspective.

Year 10 and 11 – Pupils are nearing the end of their first unit on their Key Stage 4 core RE lessons. There have been some wonderful debates and questions that have come out of their course of study. Often these debates are on topics that pupils would not get to chance to discuss in other areas of the curriculum. It is pleasing to see pupils engaging in this discourse to widen their understanding and perspective on the world in which we live, whilst being respectful to other pupils and the beliefs they may hold.

GCSE RE

Year 10 – Pupils have looking at religious attitudes around life and death this term. This involved conversations about creation, abortion, euthanasia and end of life. Pupils have been working hard on their explanation and evaluation skills. This has led to some excellent well-structured and well-presented arguments. It is pleasing to see the effort that pupils are putting into their work and I hope that this continues.

Year 11 – Pupils have spent the time up until their mocks revising all the required knowledge for both Christianity and Islam. Pupils have been working hard on their exam

skill by practising varying exam questions. There have been some excellent displays of knowledge and understanding in class discussions. Pupils need to keep working hard on their homework and independent revision. After their mocks pupils will begin their revision of Component 1. As a reminder to pupils, intervention will continue to run 3pm-4pm on Wednesday week A only.





ECO FRIENDLY CHRISTMAS TIPS

Happy Christmas everyone! Did you know that glittery and foil wrapping papers cannot be recycled? Shiny papers are made with a plastic film. There is a

scrunch test you can do, so if it doesn't scrunch up like a normal piece of paper, it needs to go in the general waste. There are things we can do to overcome this:

- * Use brown paper. You'll be surprised how lovely brown parcel paper actually looks, and it has that "back to the old days" feel to it.



Growth mindset tip no.6: Engage in deliberate practice

The "Growth mindset" is the belief that "your basic qualities are things you can cultivate through your efforts" — Carol Dweck

Theory: Malcom Gladwell says most performers practise for around 1,000 hours per year. Daniel Willingham says that deliberate practise "reinforces the basic skills required for more advanced skills, it protects against forgetting, and improves transfer".

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT



Action: We should provide children with plenty of opportunities to practise and develop their knowledge and skills both in school and at home. There are two kinds of practise proven to be most effective:

- 1. Distributed practice a schedule of practise that spreads out study activities over time e.g. spaced revision of topics before a test.
- 2. Interleaved practice a schedule of practise that mixes different kinds of problems, or a schedule of study that mixes different kinds of materials within a single study session.

On a final note, I would like to thank you, the parents and carers, for your continued support in what has been a very difficult time for everyone.


