Dear Parents and Carers,

Well done to you and your children for everything you have achieved so far this term. Completing five hours of learning at home every day requires incredible resilience and determination, and staff are reporting how well your children are doing. We have sent home 650 praise postcards so far – highlighting the exceptional effort and outstanding work from your children!

Please take a few minutes to complete the parent feedback questionnaire on our remote learning provision: https://forms.gle/jAp5AWBKrsd85yad9. We are also conducting surveys with the students too, as we seek to continually reflect on and improve our remote learning provision.

The government advised this week that children in England will not return to school until at least 8th March. For our Year 11 parents, it is likely that your child's teachers will be required to submit their GCSE grades; they will only be able to do this based on evidence. Please continue to ensure your child is working hard and engaging in all their subjects and submitting the work requested of them.

Our first virtual parents' evening was a great success. Following the evening, 63 parents completed our survey: 100% said the Talaxy booking system was easy to use and 61 said they preferred virtual parents' evenings to standing in the hall for three hours! A number of parents felt five minute meetings were a little too short and we will look at how we can address this with the time we have.

It is vital that we all continue to look after your child's education and mental and physical wellbeing during these next months. Now more than ever, with the prospect of staying at home, remote learning requires motivation, encouragement and reward – even if it is a favourite family film or treat at the end of every week and we will aim to send rewards out too. The use of Teams enables your child to be connected to their teachers and their classmates. If you or your child have any worries or concerns, do not hesitate in reaching out to us for support; there is always someone at the end of the phone or email.

I miss not having our full team in school but understand that we must continue to follow the Government's guidance to keep everyone in our families, our school and our community safe. Please rest assured that we will continue to keep delivering high-quality lessons and stay connected with you all at home.



#### From Miss Higgins - History

Here are two amazing history assessments, from Josh Wilson and Phoebe. They had to analyse two different interpretations of the British Empire and explain why the authors had different views. These are superb!

Do the interpretations support the view that the British Empire is something we should be proud of?

Niall Ferguson holds the view that we should be proud of Empire and it is something we should support. In source 1 it says "the British Empire acted as an agency for relatively incorrupt government... there therefore seems a plausible case that empire enhanced global welfore. in other words, it was a goad thing. I know the Empire was positive because by 1900 in India the British had improved trade from 2X-20%. I also know that they introduced parliamentary democracy in Australia. Dies source was written by Naill Ferguson who probably halds this view because he is from white, British educated background, whose family generations ago probably benefitted from Empire.

Will balrymple's view, however, does not support the view that Empire is something to be proud of. In source 2 it says "The EIC operated purely for shareholders' profit - it wasn't there to win votes or help people when things went wrongs," know that the EIC was a British company. I also know in 1899, here was a series of famines because of the change from 'crop to cash', 5 million people died and the British were poor administrating relief. The source was written by Will Dalrymple and they probably hold this view because he has focused more on India which had a lot more negatives than positives during the time of Empire.

Overall, the sources disagree about Empire because they are written by different people with different views on the world. Both sources have different views because one person will have benefitted more from Empire and the other has studied a more sensitive period in history and the Empire.

Josh, an Exceptional piece of work. You have covered authorship, knowledge and the content of both sources well. Well done 😊


Niall Ferguson's view supports the view that we should be proud of Empire. In source 1 by Niall Ferguson it asys "No organisation in history has done more to promote the free movement of goods, capital and labour." This suggests that in his opinion Empire is one of the greatest things to ever happen. He only sees the positives of Empire and kind of forgests there ever was negatives. I know the Empire was positive because: it helped Canada's economy by building railways. This also provided lots of jobs and helped people develop skills in high structures such as bridges. I also know that in 1899 in South Africa the Gold industry attracted huge investment worth £75 million. It was written by Nail Ferguson in his book 'Empire, how Britain made the modern world' which only focuses on the positives of The British Empire. He holds this between the content of view because his personal views and experiences will have been on the positives and he isn't affected by the tives therefore he doesn't see them. Also, his audience is more likely to be people who have similar views and people who also won't have experienced the negatives.


Will Dalrymple view, however, does not support the view that Empire is something to be proud of. In source 2 by Will Dalrymple it says "With the British Empire we see corporations' potential for sheer heartlessness." This suggests that in his opinion Empire was just an excuse for people( like the East India company) to gain money and not help people when they need it. I know that the Empire was negative at times such as: 1899 Bengal famine where five million people died and this wasn't the only famine they had. Also, I know that sengal ramine where nive million people died and this wasn't the only ramine they had. Also, I know that although the rallways in Canada helped the economy it didn't help the native Americans because it brought lots more white settlers. Finally, I know that in Australia around 90% of the aborigines had been wiped out and partly because of diseases that the Europeans brought over in the first place. It was written by Will Dalrymple in his book.' The Anarchy, the Relentless rise of The East India company' which doesn't call them honourable like a lot of people but an anarchy. They hold this view because he focuses and mostly sees the negatives of Empire that may have affected him or his family. Things like the Indian mutiny, strapping people to canons and jailing people for sticking to their religion and not using the new cartridges.




#### From Miss Higgins—History

## Time to get growing!

Now is the time to start thinking about growing your own food. If you have an indoor room, a greenhouse, or an enclosed shelving unit



to grow plants in, then you're set. If not, I utilise all my window sill space (much to my husband's annoyance - although my mum bought me a mini greenhouse for Christmas!) until I can plant them outside. If you don't have a garden, don't think that rules out your very home homegrown fruit and vegetables. Plant pots, wall baskets, fence baskets, etc. can all be used. Just use what you have and you'll be surprised at what you can grow.


This month you can start to prepare for the growing season by making sure you have pots, compost, and seeds. The first things you can start to grow are:

- Aubergines these can be sown indoors, so this is where the windowsills, greenhouses, and conservatories come into use.
- Tomatoes these seeds can now be sown if you have a warm greenhouse. The rest of us will have to wait until March or April.
- Chilies you can also start to sow these indoors too.
- Cucumbers these can be sown in the second week of February indoors too.

You always get a lot of seeds in packets (and you don't have to buy the expensive brands either). If you don't want your house to turn into the Kew Gardens then don't sow all of them. Check the back of the packet as many seeds can be kept for a couple of years.






#### **Teaching and Learning Tip**

#### Top tips to be successful:

#### In the good old days...




In every age 'the good old days' were a myth. No one ever thought they were good at the time. For every age has consisted of crises that seemed intolerable to the people who lived through them.

What things weren't better in the past?






The number of social media users (in BILLIONSI) has continued to rise. What are the good and bad things about this?




Look at the range of platforms available. How many of these make people accountable for what they say?






If we were to try and make the internet a kinder place, who could make the most difference?
