

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope that you enjoy this special edition of the Millfield Messenger, which aims to be a celebration of just some of your children's many

As always, I end the year by saying how incredibly proud I am of Team Millfield: our children, our families, our staff; we have all worked together, through the many ups and downs of this year, to ensure our team has been protected and our children have been well educated. I believe

I would like to thank them all for their dedication to our students and wish them all the very best in their future careers.

May I take this opportunity to wish you a safe and restful summer, and whilst most of us will not be traveling abroad this year, I hope that you enjoy quality family time with your family.

English



What's happening in English?

As this academic year draws to a close, students are completing their units of learning and beginning to look forward to a well deserved rest. The English staff continue to be so impressed by the resilience and positivity of our students in the face of continuous change.

In the spirit of looking ahead, the English team are looking forward to welcoming our new Year 7 students. We hope that all students have received their copies of 'Boy at the Back of

the Class' and we look forward to sharing our collective experience of reading this novel in the first few lessons in September. Some optional tasks have also been sent home for students to complete if they wish. These can be handed in on the first week of term. Next year, we have some exciting plans for reading and writing clubs and we'll be chatting to students to find out which extra-curricular activities they would like to get involved with through English.

Our current Year 7 students have completed end of term tests and have received feedback on these to ensure that they make excellent progress. In September, they will begin by studying 'Lord of the Flies' and a unit of work on 'Freedom'.

Year 8 will move into the final year of Key Stage 3 in September and they will begin the year by studying the fantastic novel 'Of Mice and Men'.

Excitingly, our current Year 9 will begin their full GCSE course in September; they have already had a head start, having studied a modern play during the final term of this year. Some students in our current Year 9 have been taking part in the Lancashire Book of the Year group - reading a range of contemporary novels. In September, our students will be helping to choose the final winner of this prestigious award. The shortlist for Lancashire book of the year is on page 10; these texts are suitable for students in Year 9 and above and it would be lovely for more students to read them over the summer.

Year 10 will move up to Year 11 and begin their final year of GCSE study.

The English Department wishes everyone a lovely, relaxing summer break and we'll look forward to seeing everyone refreshed and ready to go in September!

Maths



Students in Years 7 and 8 completed the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge which is a 60-minute, multiple-choice challenge. It encourages mathematical reasonina. precision of thought and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are designed to make students think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience. Our students received a number of Gold, Silver and Bronze awards. Well done to all who took part!

We will continue to address any gaps in learning as students progress through KS3 and our new Year 7 will start with the topic of Algebraic Thinking. There is only a small amount of algebra at KS2 so this learning can be seen as a 'fresh start' for all.

Year 10

Our Year 10 students started the term by studying how to read and interpret different types of data followed by revising for their recent summative assessments. All students have been provided with a breakdown of their areas for development.

Our students are finishing the term studying non-calculator methods, surds and evaluating indices.
A huge well done to all our students with their effort with their revision.

'Be a Star in Maths'

Lots of our Year 10 students are working incredibly hard and to reward them we are continuing to run the 'Be a Star in Maths' initiative. Students will be

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awarded a gold star for exceptional work in class or home learning, once a student has received 5 stars they will be issued with a reward.

Science

Year 7 students have had a fantastic year in science and have studied a range of different topics. They began the year by studying scientific skills, such as collecting results, drawing graphs and evaluating data. These skills were then embedded into topics studied throughout the rest of the year and students have successfully developed these skills in topics, such as cells, separation techniques and electricity.

Year 8 students have worked incredibly hard this year and developed skills across the topics from each of the three sciences: biology, chemistry and physics. Some of the topics they have studied are food and nutrition, combustion, earth and space and students have explored different scientific concepts and ideas, building on their scientific knowledge.


Year 9 students have continued to study the first few topics from the GCSE syllabus to ensure they are ready for the transition in to year 10. They have worked extremely hard and have developed many scientific skills in topics across the three sciences, biology, chemistry and physics. Some of the topics that have been studied are genetics, reactivity and forces and motion.

During the last half term, some of our local primary schools took part in a science taster activity. Students discussed what different people in the past might have eaten and how and why would their diets be different from ours today. This led to disfrom bones found on excavations to evidence from scientific analysis of cooking pots/implements, pictorial evidence, written accounts, ethnographic evidence and evidence from farm tools/practices. Students then got a chance to take part in a 'poo' excavation project where they were challenged to work out which period of time they thought their fake 'poo' had come from based on the evidence they had retrieved.

Take a look at the photographs of students taking part as well as some feedback:

- We really enjoyed it and the children did pretty well justifying their opinions as to what period the poos came from.
- It was good to be doing something new.
- It was interesting to see what the diets were like.
- At first I thought it was disgusting, but when I got into it, it was fun.
- I enjoyed using the microscopes.

Year 10 students have been revisiting previous units which have been studied and completing mock exams in biology, chemistry and physics. Students who have been isolating have been able to use online revision resources to continue revising for the assessments. Students will be directed towards online resources that can be accessed over the summer to continue revisiting the units which have been studied so far. this will support students when they return to school in September.





















Art



Year 7—Pop Art

Year 7 have been studying and creating art work based on the style of Pop Art. Over a number of lessons, different artists in this genre have been explored. Students have been encouraged to create mood boards based on an individual artist's style. The project was completed with students designing a pop art styled shoe.

Year 8 – Skills and superheroes

It has been a busy term for Year 8. Students have been studying various drawing techniques to enable them to be more confident artists. They have been using the grid method of drawing to create some superhero inspired artworks. These skills create a foundation to build on over the next term. As they enter year 9, these skills will be used to create larger scale artworks inspired by street artists' Ben Eine and Shepard Fairey.



Year 9 - Grid Drawing and portraits

Students in Year 9 have continued to use the grid method of drawing which is used to create more accurate portraits. They have been using a range of portrait styles and studying different genres of art, including expressionism, cubism and photorealism. At the end of the term, those students who opted to do art will be given a doodle a day challenge for over summer to prepare themselves for their GCSE.




Year 10 – GCSE Art & Design

Students in Year 10 have been working exceptionally hard, exploring new media and new techniques within our workshop style lessons. They are given a short brief and two lessons to create an artwork in response. Students have already created some fantastic artworks. They have experimented with wax, improved their literacy skills and extended existing artworks. After summer, the hard work continues; they will be completing a mock exam and a mini project 'Exploring our Seaside Town.'



Dance



In **Year 8 and Year 9**, we have been studying Just Dance in

practical. All students have been working in small groups, choreographing in different styles. They have also been incorporating some of the choreographic devices and relationships into their performance. Students have enhanced their performance by including expressive skills such as facial expressions, focus, spatial awareness, musicality and projection. In theory, students have been working on a small dance project. They have created their own dance idea with a purpose to educate others and then created costumes and aural setting to accompany this. In September, Year 8 students will continue to build upon their knowledge on the technical and expressive skills. Year 9 students can identify and have their own clear choreographic intent, and in September, they will carry over skills they have learnt in dance to their option choices; these skills include teamwork, selfconfidence, communication and leadership skills.

Year 10 have continued to study section C of the written exam -Dance Anthology. We consolidated our knowledge on 'A Linha Curva' and have moved on to analysina 'Within Her Eves.' Students are studying, in detail, four production features (lighting, set/staging, aural setting and costume); they are becoming aware of why these choices were made and how these features contribute to the overall mood and stimuli of the work. Students have also learnt the set phrase 'Shift' which will be filmed in September and will go towards their GCSE. In September, students will continue to study 'Within Her Eyes' developing their knowledge on dance for camera and how this enhances the performance.



Design Technology

Year 7 are learning about aero-dynamics, kite creation and how to create pop up cards. Students are currently making prototypes for their products, ready for testing.

Year 8 are learning about new and emerging technologies, looking at 3D printing, rapid prototyping and the use of robotics in industry.

Year 9 are learning about the 6Rs, sustainability and how products can be redesigned to be more sustainable. They are about to start redesigning a product themselves, having looked at several existing products. Working in this way is a fantastic lead into GCSE giving students who wish to take the subject forward a clear idea of expectations.

Year 10 have just made a start to their NEA, exploring the three contexts ready to research over summer so we can get straight on with designing in September.

Drama &

Year 7 students are studying a scheme of work based on teenage runaways; they will explore the story of a young girl named Danie and her experiences of running away. They will consider the story from different perspectives and create scripts and creative writing pieces based on this.

Year 8 students are studying the well renowned Shakespeare play 'Macbeth', they will be exploring key moments in the story and characters. They will also be reworking elements to create a modernised version of the story which they will perform.

Year 9 students are studying the

theatre style 'murder mystery'; they will complete a live theatre review of the film 'Knives Out,' considering plot, characters and evaluating the success of the piece. They will then have the opportunity to write and perform their own 'murder mystery' script.

Year 10 GCSE drama students continue to work hard on learning the techniques required to answer the written paper which is based on 'Blood Brothers'. They are also completing live theatre reviews on the musicals 'Legally Blonde' and 'Everybody's talking about Jamie'.



Our Year 11 students have enjoyed 2 weeks of bespoke lessons, introducing them to the drama and theatre studies course at BSFC. They have looked at Greek theatre and explored Sophocles' 'Antigone'. They have also looked at Berkoff's 'Metamorphosis'. Students have enjoyed some virtual talks with Cassia Turner who left Millfield in 2018 and currently studies drama and theatre studies, musical theatre and dance at BSFC. These talks were incredibly useful in helping them prepare for their further studies.

Film & **Media Studies**

Year 10 Media Studies students are currently studying activities to help them prepare for their coursework which is to make a music video, magazine, tv programme or film marketing material. They will be taking photographs and film footage

over the summer holidays in preparation for completing the coursework when we return to school in September.

Year 10 Film Studies students are currently in the middle of creating story boards and carrying out some test filming in preparation for creating their short film in their chosen genre once we return to school in September.

Food



Year 7 students have consolidated their learning by devising group presentations on healthy eating or the importance of eating a wide range of fruit and vegetables. This was done through interviews, songs and quizzes. After this, students looked at the importance of ethical and environmental considerations such as food miles, seasonality of products and packaging requirements.

Year 8 students have been working collaboratively on becoming the next 'Pizza Apprentice' in a group activity task. The students had to design logos, pizza ideas, packaging, food menus (including costing) and then presented their pitch to 'Lord Sugar', trying to beat the competition in their form.

Year 9 students have investigated different nutrients and dietary needs. This information was then used to develop a mini enterprise task based on a 'street food' theme. Students had the opportunity to complete some sensory analysis work on different styles of street foods. Next year, students will be able to enjoy completing practical tasks once again based on the recipe booklets which will be provided at the start of each new rotation.

Year 10 GCSE students have been focusing on formal exam assessment with revision

preparation completed. A practical set task was also



carried out on British cuisine. This is in preparation for the real GCSE task which will be issued at the start of the next academic year.



Geography



Year 7 have been studying 'Weather in the UK'. During their first term as Year 8, they will be studying work, rest and play in the UK.

Year 8 have been studying 'Our Physical World'. During their first term as Year 9 they will be studying 'Our Unequal World'.

Year 9 have been studying 'World Cities'. We are excited to see that a lot of students have chosen either GCSE Geography or Travel and Tourism for their options. Those who have chosen Geography will start the GCSE with 'Natural Hazards' whereas the Travel and Tourism students will learn about- 'UK Travel and Tourism Destinations'.

Year 10 are learning about 'Cold Environments' and when they return as Year 11, they will be studying human geography, focusing on urban change and sustainability.

To the Year 6 students who are ending their primary years, we look forward to welcoming you in Year 7 when you will be studying 'An Introduction to the UK.

Health & Social Care

Year 10 students are currently learning about the different health and social care services that individuals will use at some point in their lifetime and why they may use the services (including primary, secondary, and tertiary care services).



The history department have really enjoyed teaching new topics this year: from the Silk Roads in Year 7, the Black Tudors in Year 8, to pre-colonial African Kingdoms in Year 9. We are really looking forward to building on these topics and introducing more new scholarship into lessons next year.



The department are proud of how the different year groups dealt with challenging end of unit assessments and how much revision and hard work had gone into preparing for them.



I.C.T. and **Enterprise & Marketing**

This term, **Key Stage 3** students have been studying what defines a 'computer'. They explored embedded systems and secondary storage. To finish the academic year, students were tasked with a business studies style challenge where they had to design their own trainer. They studied the 4Ps of business, created their own logo and developed a design for their new shoe.

Year 10 Enterprise and Marketing completed their summer assessment after a couple of weeks of revision. Students were allocated a topic each and were asked to develop their own revision resource for that topic. We had mindmaps, flash cards,

knowledge organisers and even a snakes and ladders board game! Year 10 Creative iMedia also had their summer assessment following a number of revision sessions.

Modern Foreig Language

Year 7 and Year 8, despite the interruptions to school life due to "la pandémie", students in both year groups have been learning how to describe holiday activities in French in addition to where they go. They have also been learning how to talk about holiday activities in the present and future tenses. Some lesson time has also been allocated to developing a better understanding of French films and we have started with Luc Besson's 'Taxi 2' which students have thoroughly enjoyed. September will hopefully see the start of two language learning opportunities for students:

Chinese Club – which will offer students the chance to learn Mandarin (some students will have already started to learn this in

primary school, and the club will give them a chance to carry on with their learning).

Deutsches Mittagessen (German Lunch) – as the name suggests, will be a lunchtime club with a focus on all things German (including the food!). Further details for both clubs will be announced once days and times are confirmed.

Year 9 students have been learning how to describe where they go on holiday as well as memorable past holiday experiences. They have also been finding out about typical celebrations in French-speaking countries. Students have also been learning about the importance of breaking down the French language into smaller chunks and learning these using the "10 minutes a day" approach in order to store vocabulary more effectively in their long-term memory.

Year 10 students have been learning to discuss school life and have been looking at ways to improve their written work using grade booster phrases which we have been adapting for different topics. Schools in England have now been told that there will be a speaking exam next year as part of the GCSE exams and so we have set to work strengthening these skills. This has been particularly during intervention classes where students have been learning to increase their fluency when giving their opinions on a range of topics from takeaway foods through to the music of Snoop Dogg!



Music



Our students have been able to continue making progress in their instrumental music lessons in brass, woodwind, strings, drums and guitar. We're very fortunate to have an excellent group of peripatetic teachers who visit each week.

Year 7 students have started to appraise a range of popular song styles and have enjoyed singing in small groups.

Year 8 have been studying Black Musical Cultural Heritage and have completed their assessment on Funk and Disco music.

Year 9 have been preparing a suitable song set list for a mini performance project!

Year 10 have started to run their rehearsals for their Unit 2 events. Year 10 will be recording their live performances in September, then putting together and releasing their virtual events soon after this. In September, students will have the privilege of having their music lessons in the newly refurbished music room.

P.E.



We have had a fantastic final half term of PE lessons. It has been great to see so many students taking part in rounders and softball with enthusiasm! We have noticed a significant improvement in students' batting skills over the past few weeks – lots of full rounders and home runs have been scored!

Year 7 and Year 8 students have clearly been using their knowledge organisers, as their knowledge of the rules has improved which has positively impacted on their performance in a game.

We look forward to September, when hopefully, we can have a full extra-curricular programme and get as many students as possible participating in extra-curricular sport!

P.S.H.E.



We have had a fantastic half term with many super learning days occurring, as well as exciting lessons across all year groups.

We have had our first **Year 9**First Aid day, where the students were able to explore the different techniques and skills to save someone's life.

Years 7 and 9 had their first RSE days. The aim of RSE is to give young people the information they need to help them develop healthy, nurturing relationships of all kinds, not just intimate relationships. It enables them to know what a healthy relationship looks like and what makes a good friend, a good colleague, a successful marriage, or other type of committed relationship.

In lessons, KS3 students have been looking at developing their understanding of mental health and resilience. Students have been looking at ways to develop a growth mindset and ensure they do not give up when faced with adversity.

In KS4 lessons, students have been exploring British Values and ensuring our students are ready for living in a modern British society. Students have been able to debate issues such as homelessness and the stereotypes of tattoos.

R.E.



Year 7 students have spent the final term studying about what makes a good neighbour before finishing the year with the question "How does religion make the world a better place?" Students have been working hard on their skill of how to write in RE by breaking down how to create a paragraph using the information from lessons. It was pleasing to see students using these writing techniques in their end of year assessment.

Year 8 students have studied Jesus and whether he was a man or an all-powerful God before finishing the year looking at why dharma is important to Hindus. Students have remained highly engaged in their learning despite the disruption by asking some thought provoking and philosophical questions about the topics. It is this analytical approach to studying religion that will get them an excellent foundation to engage with more ethical enquiry questions next vear.

Year 9 students have studied whether suffering makes it impossible to believe in God by looking at Jewish reflections on the Holocaust. Students have shown areat maturity throughout in order to ask meaningful but sensitive questions to help them uncover the impact the event had on so many religious people's lives. There has been great enthusiasm to learn more about the topic and understand the event from a perspective they may not have chance to before.

Year 10 Core RE students have been given the chance to consider whether suffering makes it impossible to believe in God by also reflecting on the Holocaust. This is due to the fact that the department felt it would

be inappropriate to study the Holocaust during last year's lockdown as this topic needs guided supervision in order to be studied and understood in a safe environment. Students have been asking some very thought provoking, analytical, and philosophical questions to understand the perspective of all those involved in the event. By doing this, students have been able to understand why Jewish people view and even talk about the event in numerous ways due to their own personal experience.



Year 10 GCSE RE students have now finished all learning for the course. Students are currently working through their own assigned topics in order to create an overall picture of the course and how all the information links together. This will allow students to see how knowledge can be used across the course and not just in isolation for various questions and help them understand the parts of the course they are less confident with. Next year, students will have the opportunity to revisit the entire course alongside practising exam technique to ensure that they are fully prepared for their GCSE.



Sociology




Revision Strategy 5: Knowledge Organisers

Why are Cornell notes useful?

It is a great system for taking, organising and reviewing notes.

The system itself encourages you to reflect on your notes by actively summarising them in your own words. Often, this can already be enough to remember study notes and to successfully pass an exam. How to create a set of Cornell notes:

- Make notes from your lesson or revision guide in the main note-taking column (a template is available on the school website).
- The smaller column on the left side is for keywords or comments that make the whole reviewing and exam preparation process easier.
- When reviewing the notes, a brief summary of every page should be written into the section at the bottom.




