It has been an outstanding fortnight at Team Millfield. The whole staff team have commented on how superb your children have been; we cannot recall a September start as fantastic as this one! Behaviour around school is outstanding – I have already given tours with prospective new students and their families and they all comment about how calm and purposeful lessons are and how the children and staff are so happy!



Our outstanding MFL department were superb last Friday. We were one of fifty schools chosen for an educational research visit, looking at best practice in the teaching of languages. Huge well done to the languages team and all the students who impressed our visitor.




As a school we are delighted to launch the 'Key Stage 3 Graduation Programme' for Year 9.

The aim of this programme is to give Key Stage 3 its own identity and to encourage

A scoring system is awarded out of 12. Attendance is based on in school sessions. Authorised absences are included in the attendance score as missed sessions in school.

#### TEACHING AND LEARNING

Just a few months ago, oracy, the skill of speaking and listening well, was back in the Political headlines. leaders political emphasised that teaching students to talk confidently and to be articulate is incredibly important to a student's success.

Traditionally, some people might have held the view that oracy is a naturally acquired skill that young people will pick up as they go along. Except that many students do not. Even when starting school, some students are up to 19 months behind their peers in terms of their ability to use language and how they use vocabulary.

Our aim at Millfield is to ensure that all our students are able to express themselves articulately and fluently. Explicitly teaching oracy skills will play a significant part in achieving this goal.

#### What have we done already?

Last year, staff undertook training to help that students worked them ensure effectively in pairs. This involved a focus on the think – pair – share technique. Students were taught to think about what they knew independently about a topic, they were then paired with another student and then ultimately shared their ideas with each other, and the whole class. Staff also learned how to set up collaborative learning – using groups to enhance learning by students working together.

#### What will be doing this year?

This year, staff will undertake further training in how to explicitly teach oracy to help our students make better progress, faster.

We will be learning how to model verbal language effectively in the classroom and how to discuss formality with students.

Staff will teach students to speak like a historian, or a mathematician, or a scientist, and so forth so that students are able to confidently express themselves across their different subjects, selecting the appropriate vocabulary and style of language for the situation.

Additionally, staff will be teaching students to listen actively so that they take turns and can manage spoken interactions. Staff will ensure that time is given to oracy in lessons so that there are many opportunities to practise oracy skills in class.

Staff are really looking forward to continuing to develop this important skill. As always, if you would like to find out more, contact the Teaching & Learning team (Miss Cook, Mr. Hodgkinson and Mr Tyson), who will be happy to discuss this with you further.

#### WHAT IS ORACY?

Oracy is to speaking what numeracy is to mathematics or literacy to reading and writing. In short, it's nothing more than being able to express yourself well across a range of contexts. It's about having the vocabulary to say what you want to say and the ability to structure your thoughts so that they make sense to others.



#### 'The Girl who Speaks Bear'


Found abandoned in a bear cave as a baby, Yanka has always wondered where she is from.

Here are some of the specific things we will be doing:






# Deputy Headteacher's Maths Challenge Cut Cube Puzzle
